On the Africa Naturally farm we recorded 675 ml of rain in February and 345 ml in March. This is a minimum as often overnight the gauge overflowed. The storms were dramatic with thunder crashing overhead and lightning cracking through the sky. For he will hide me in his shelter in the day of trouble; he will conceal me under the cover of his tent; he will lift me high upon a rock.



God meets all our needs. He protects us when we need it and I thank Him.


Compared to just 10 years ago, weather patterns are now chaotic and it's no longer possible to plan for crops around the traditional rainy season. Where flooding and cyclones occurred around every 5-7 years, we are now experiencing this type of weather, late rains etc., every year.

Rains in our area only started in February, rather than in December, and we then had cyclone Freddy, twice, bringing extensive flooding followed by cholera outbreaks.

I spent time rebuilding the farm road, wading around in water up to my knees, and days spent in my tent waiting for storms to cease. Munhope (guard) and I were checking on each other a few times a day and otherwise, I had Dolly and the cats for company. Others were at home stranded.

As the farm is off grid, we had no power cuts and I am so thankful that the solar energy did not run out and neither did my phone credit but food and cooking was a bit of a challenge.

Due to the weather, I spent significant time with the three churches accessible by road



Storms and flooding meant that I spent time with only three churches, all in Dondo. It was a great blessing to spend this time with them and to be there with them during such a difficult time.

Two churches are new to Growing Hope and we were able to spend every Saturday together looking at the Farming God's Way biblical messages and watching the FGW videos on my iPad. Preparation of the church vegetable gardens was during the week in between, as rain allowed.

They have had difficulty germinating vegetable seed so far this year. Sowing started late due to the storms and flooding but there is some germination which is encouraging for all. Grown in three sections for annual rotation are **root**: carrots, onion, turnip and beetroot, **leaf**: lettuce, cabbage, cove and kale, **fruit**: tomatoes, aubergine, cucumber and sweet peppers.










FOM: We give thanks as the FOM team has had a great start to the vegetable growing season. We built a small nursery by the FOM field and sowed seed in March, improved the drains around the field and waited for the ground to dry enough to transplant seedlings.







FOM: Catching up with Pastor and Mama Rego. I had some good conversations with Pastor Rego as we discussed how God has been faithful over the past couple of years. Below L, building a new dorm for boys and centre, boys helping. They also hope to build a nursery school for orphans and community children. God's amazing love and blessing as Dado's legs, both crooked when younger (bottom R) are now straight (centre bottom), with P Rego, R. We continue to provide vegetables and support the church garden managed by Antonio, top L, and Luis receiving seed. This provides significant nutrition for the 70 children and the Rego's are

extremely thankful for the abundant gift of vegetables.







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My huge thanks for your prayers. I did receive my visa, an answer to prayer, and was very much protected during the storms. Time with Pastors and their teams were fruitful.

British Airways did not accept the visa and would not allow me on the plane on 2nd February so I had to return to Sevenoaks and plead with the Mozambique High Commission to write a letter confirming my visa was valid. After three visits to the HC, I received a letter which was very useful for the next flight 10 days later and on arrival at Beira airport, where I had to have an interview before being admitted.

After several visits to immigration in Beira they issued my long-term visa which can be renewed easily in March 2024.

I thank each of you for your prayers and I hope you will continue to pray for Growing Hope, all involved, our brothers and sisters in Mozambique, FOM and for me.

I have booked flights to return in early July until early September. Please pray for good conversations, biblical teaching, the visit to Caia and that I would be an encouragement to the church leaders and the team.
